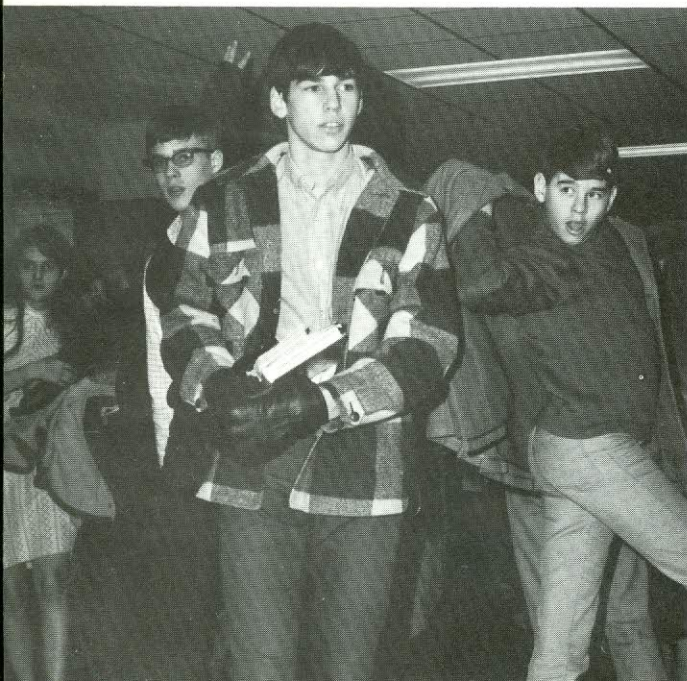
The freshmen tried all year to equal the upper classmen, and most everyone told you that their reactions were at times amusing.

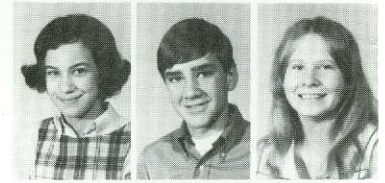

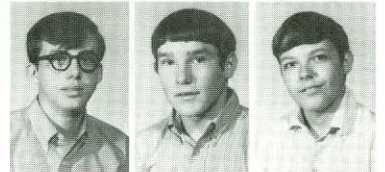

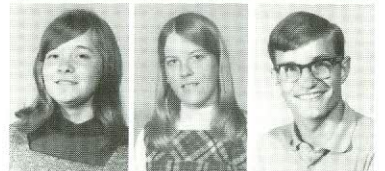
